In today's world, many of us wonder how we are going to keep our kids safe. There are all types of dangers we did not have years ago – many revolve around today's advanced technology. Although technology is supposed to help us advance and leap forward, technology creates more worries for parents today than that of parents yesterday.

Currently, a hot topic among educators and legislators is Data Privacy. We are examining legislation of other states to help us make sure our language is strong. There are entities that are against parents having a choice to "opt out" of collecting our children's data (statistical or aggregate) that is available to different parties. The issue really takes a turn with no one really knowing the specifics of what data is taken and what is being done with it at all times. FERPA (Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act) is in place already, but if there was a data breech, such as some of the big corporations have had, there is nothing in place to deal with that. If you are asking yourself, as I did, why would anyone want to use our children's data? The answer is identity theft. We do NOT ever want our children to be in harm's way and there are plenty of criminals that can exploit that avenue. There are rules, plans, and processes in place regarding our children's safety we just want to make sure there is strong language in place. On a federal level Senator Mark Kirk's education committee is looking to make changes to the FERPA. It is important our voices are at the table.

I urge you to let me know how you, as parents, would like me to speak on your behalf or you can contact your legislators and let them know how you feel. A bill should be moving forward hopefully in the winter but definitely in the spring session.

TIPS FOR RECORDING THE MINUTES

Record minutes that are brief, yet contain all important information needed to check past proceedings.



- Record what is done, not what is said.
- Do not reflect the secretary's personal opinion about anything that is said or done.
- Record the business in the order it happened.
- Write minutes immediately following the meeting.
- Send an advance copy of the minutes to the president as soon as they are completed.
- Record the name of the member who introduced the motion and the results of the vote (carried or lost).
- Do not record the name of a person who offered the second.
- Record a ballot vote as follows: number of eligible votes, number of affirmative votes (ayes), and number of negative votes (no's). For an election, include the name of the nominees and the number of votes each nominee received. A motion to destroy the ballots is in order.

Making a New Year's resolution this year? We're here to help you start your year off right. Check out the ideas below to help your family have a happy and healthy 2015!

1) Make half your plate fruits and vegetables. By following MyPlate and making each meal half

fruits and vegetables, you can help to ensure you are getting nutrients needed to lead a healthy lifestyle. Look for fruits and vegetables that are red, orange and dark green – they are full of vitamins and minerals.



- 2) Cook more meals at home. You can start with cooking just one more meal each week. The key is to prepare in advance and check out resources like the MyPlate board on Pinterest to find new recipe ideas that are both delicious and good for you. Cooking at home lets you control portion sizes and sodium levels and often leads to healthier meals.
- 3) **Drink more water.** You are what you drink, and when you drink water, you <u>Drink Up</u>. Keep a reusable bottle filled with water with you throughout the day as a reminder and an easy way to stay hydrated. To mix it up, try adding fresh fruit, like oranges or lemons, to your water for fun and a little flavor.
- 4) Try new activities. Discover new things you and your family can do to be active and have fun. Get creative and find activities that require little or no equipment so you aren't limited by what you have or don't have. However, every PTA should also have publicity releases for the students that they publicize. This is especially important if you publish an e-newsletter or post your newsletter on your PTA website.

Technology continues to swirl around us and directly impact our schools with popular apps from 2014 like YikYak and KiK as well as older apps such as Instagram and Omelge. As sites like Snapchat continue to evolve (recently adding live chat and messaging features), it's imperative that we continue to deliver messages of safety and responsibility to our students, while keeping parents and school staff up-to date on the ever-changing trends. Already in 2015, kids have been buzzing about new apps including Streetchat, After School and Swipe; many students are misusing these latest apps and sites, which inevitably spills into our schools causing major issues (and often legal implications). Did you know that:

- Children ages 8-18 spend an average of 7.5 hours A DAY using some sort of device*
- A new 2014 report shows that 88% of teens have witnessed cyberbullying*
- "Anonymous" apps such as Streetchat have been shaking entire school systems around the country, with some students using these apps to post serious threats

Be sure to have talks with your children about the dangers they could be in. As much as we want to ignore these apps, remember in order to safeguard our children we need to know the technology available to our children; so log on under your child's account (it is our responsibility to know all their accounts and passwords) and learn the apps they use or create your own accounts so you can learn firsthand about the apps. Know the app names and do your own search on the capabilities and uses of the apps your child uses. Who knows, you might stumble on an app that could work to help with your PTA business.

7 New Year's Resolutions Every Family Should Make in 2015

The following media resolutions are designed to be easy, fun, totally doable, and family-strengthening.

Focus on content quality, not screen-time quantity. It's not that screen time doesn't matter (kids need a balance of activities for healthy development). But trying to tally up all the minutes your kids spend in front of a screen -- and feeling

guilty when they go "over" -- helps nothing. This year, focus on becoming actively engaged in your kids' media. Help them make quality, age-appropriate choices, play or watch together when you can, and talk about any issues that come up. Some days they may spend a little more time on the computer learning to code, but the next day they may end up making crafts all day. It balances out.

Play a game with your kid. Maybe you love video games; maybe you'd rather do just about anything else. The point is; kids love games. There's a certain kind of bond that develops when families compete -- plus, it's fun. Playing games with your kids also imparts important skills, such as taking turns, gracefully, graciously, losing practicing good sportsmanship. Look for video games the entire family can enjoy.

Learn something online. Make this the year you finally learn to crochet, play guitar, or master a foreign language -- whatever you've longed to do. With so many opportunities for online learning, from casual how-to's to formal lessons, there's no excuse not to. Your kids will see you work toward a goal, manage your time, be patient with yourself, and discover you're not perfect at everything. Bonus points for taking a class with your kid!

Embrace the next new thing. At some point this year, a killer app, viral video, or hot new show will take your kids by storm. Keep an open mind and explore this new thing along with them. You'll learn more about what your kids are doing, how they can safely use new tools, and how to guide them through a changing landscape. Ask: What's your favorite new app, game, or website? What do you like about it? How can you make sure you're using it responsibly, respectfully, and safely?

Do some good. Show your kids that the real power of the Web is in how it can connect those in need to those who can help out. In addition to traditional charities, there are sites that let you target your gift to specific donors, find volunteer opportunities, promote causes you believe in, and even let your kids lead the charge.

Go indie. Expand your family's entertainment horizons with independently produced movies, TV

shows, apps, and video games. Stepping away from mainstream offerings exposes your kids to cultural differences, non-stereotypical characters, creative storytelling, and thought-provoking ideas.

Stop texting and driving. Nobody wants to admit it, but the accident statistics tell the real story: We are still texting and driving. Not only is it dangerous, it also sends a bad message to your kids when you ignore the law. Consider an app that temporarily disables the phone when you're driving (and install one on your kid's phone, too).

LEGISLATION

With the "lame duck" session behind us, the 99th General Assembly has begun. With the recent changes from the past election, this may prove to be an especially interesting session. There are many things as child advocates we may want to voice opinions on. Budget, vouchers, and charter schools will all be addressed. Additionally, SB3902 regarding data privacy is anticipated to be heard. A grade span testing bill is expected to be proposed by the NEA (National Education Association) as well.

On January 13th U.S. Senate education committee Chairman Lamar Alexander (R-Tenn.) announced on the Senate floor his plans to fix the No Child Left Behind law, wrapping up six years of committee work and sending a bill to the Senate floor within the first few weeks of 2015. The Chairman said, "No Child Left Behind has become unworkable—and fixing this law, which expired over seven years ago, will be the first item on the agenda for the Senate education committee," The chairman stated that he is looking to keep the best portions of the law, while restoring responsibility to states and local communities and ensuring that all 50 million students in our nation's 100,000 public schools can succeed. The first hearing is scheduled for Wednesday, January 21 – "Fixing No Child Left Behind: Testing and Accountability". To access the discussion draft, click HERE.

ILLINOIS LEGISLATION PASSED

New Illinois E-Cigarette Law to Protect Children

Illinois PTA has covered the <u>dangers of e-cigarettes</u> for children, and beginning January 1, 2015, there is a new law in Illinois to help protect children from accessing e-cigarettes. The new law requires e-cigarettes for sale to be behind the counter or in a sealed display case to keep them out of the hands of children.

The law also addresses the potential poisoning of children who may drink liquid nicotine from refill bottles, requiring the bottles to be childproof. While the bottles of nicotine, which are flavored and have appealing aromas for children, are relatively small, the nicotine concentration in the bottle is often close to the lethal dose for young children of 65 pounds or more. Poison control centers across the country have reported an exponential increase in calls related to child poisoning from e-cigarette's nicotine liquids. The American Association of Poison Control Centers reports that reports of exposure to liquid nicotine and e-cigarette devices tripled between 2012 and 2013, and have doubled again between 2013 and 2014.

Nominations may be submitted by a:


- PTA unit, council or district in good standing as defined by the state in which they are chartered, and
