NEWSLETTER– Michele Sheppard

With the number of e-newsletters increasing annually, this is a good time to consider some tips on how to publish an effective newsletter.

1. Subject line. What you write in the subject area can make a huge difference to your e-newsletter. A phrase that teases the reader could at least get them to open up the e-newsletter.
2. When to send the newsletter? Research shows that e-newsletters that are received after 5 pm on Friday and over the weekend have a low open rate. Also avoid school holidays as people may be away from their computer and the message will get lost or deleted.
3. Know your audience. The age and education level of your readers should be considered when determining the writing style for your newsletter.
4. Tips on content.
 - a. Start with a thank you and a teaser of the content of the rest of the newsletter. This will help to get people to read on.
 - b. Have a table of contents and important dates to generate interest in content.

MID-YEAR BUDGET CHECK-UP

For most of the PTAs in our area, the mid-year point is nearly upon us, and it is a perfect time to look at the budget your membership adopted to see where you are in relation to where you want to be! In preparing for a budget review, remember to look at both the anticipated income and anticipated expenditure side of the budget. What percentage of fund-raising activities have been completed? Are they "on-target" with the anticipated results? If you have exceeded your expectations what options could/should you consider? Here are a couple of suggestions: eliminate any unnecessary fund-raising activities by making them "member benefits" --FREE to members; if you have a signed contract with a vendor, how will additional funds impact your adopted budget--where will the funds go? Will unanticipated income require you to amend the budget for the membership to approve?



Have you provided for attendance at the annual PTA Convention in your budget? This year, the convention will be geared towards meeting the needs of local units by providing in-depth training in areas that the membership has indicated is vital to their needs. You have an advantage--convention is right around the corner at the Schaumburg Marriott March 9 - 10. Each PTA is entitled to be represented at the convention by the president and delegates as determined by the number of members in the local unit. This is YOUR opportunity to make your voice heard, as the convention is where the business of the Illinois PTA is conducted. Much like the operation of a local unit, the state has bylaws, a budget and elections that voted on by YOU the members. If you are not in attendance, your voice cannot be heard.

Finally, check to be sure that any informational documents required by governmental agencies have been filed in accordance with the established regulations.

Happy 2012 with 20 Healthy New Year's Resolutions for Kids

Now that it is a brand new year, it is good to start 2012 with some resolutions. Thanks to the American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP) and their web-site, www.healthychildren.org, here are some New Year tips to help you help your preschoolers, 5 to 12 year old children and those older teens to have a safe and healthy year.



Preschoolers

- I will **clean up** my toys and put them where they belong.
- I will brush my **teeth** twice a day, and wash my hands after going to the **bathroom** and before **eating**.
- I won't tease dogs or other pets – even friendly ones. I will **avoid being bitten** by keeping my fingers and face away from their mouths.

Kids, 5- to 12-years-old

- I will drink reduced-fat milk and water **every day**, and drink soda and fruit drinks only on special occasions.
- I will apply **sunscreen** before I go outdoors on bright sunny days. I will try to stay in the shade whenever possible and wear a hat and sunglasses, especially when I'm playing sports.
- I will try to **find a sport** (like basketball or soccer) or an activity (like playing tag, jumping rope, dancing or riding my bike) that I like and do it at least three times a week!
- I will always wear a helmet when bicycling.
- I will wear my seat belt every time I get in a car. I'll sit in the back seat and use a **booster seat** until I am tall enough to use a lap/shoulder seat belt.
- I'll be nice to other kids. I'll be **friendly** to kids who need friends – like someone who is shy, or is new to my school.

- I'll never give out personal information such as my name, home address, school name or telephone number **on the Internet**. Also, I'll never send a picture of myself to someone I chat with on the computer without my parent's permission.

Kids, 13-years-old and up

- I will try to eat two servings of fruit and two servings of vegetables **every day**, and I will drink sodas only on special occasions.
- I will take care of my body through **physical activity** and nutrition.
- I will choose non-violent television shows and video games, and I will spend only one to two hours each day – at the most – on these activities.
- I will help out in my community – through volunteering, working with community groups or by joining a group that helps people in need.
- When I feel angry or **stressed out**, I will take a break and find constructive ways to deal with the stress, such as exercising, reading, writing in a journal or discussing my problem with a parent or friend.
- When faced with a difficult decision, I will talk about my choices with an adult whom I can trust.
- When I notice my friends are struggling or engaging in risky behaviors, I will talk with a trusted adult and attempt to find a way that I can help them.
- I will be careful about whom I choose to **date**, and always treat the other person with respect and without coercion or violence. I will expect the same good behavior in return.
- I will **resist peer pressure** to try drugs and alcohol.
- I agree not to use a cell phone or text message while **driving** and to always use a seat belt.

LEGISLATION – Matthew Rodriguez

Hello All,

In this article I want to discuss what has been going on with the NCLB Act of 2001. Currently it is subject to the restrictions and conditions in Section 9401 of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA), as amended by the No Child Left Behind Act of 2001 (Public Law 107-110), the Secretary of Education may waive statutory or regulatory requirements of the ESEA that are applicable to State Educational Agencies, local educational agencies, Indian tribes, or schools.

What the buzz is about?

In order to make "adequate yearly progress" (AYP) under the law, schools must satisfy ever-increasing performance targets set by states. AYP [measures the percentage of students making certain target scores](#) on standardized tests in reading and math and graduation rates -- regardless of students' growth. For example, if a student grows two grade levels during a school year but is still below the NCLB-set bar, his scores count against the school's AYP rating.

Under NCLB, schools that fail to make AYP for two years in a row in the same category, such as graduation rate, are deemed "Needs Improvement." These schools face consequences, such as requiring supplemental education or giving students the option to transfer into another AYP-making public school or charter school. Schools that fail to make AYP for longer periods of time can face restructuring interventions that involve staff turnover.

Built into NCLB is the requirement that all students be proficient across subjects by 2014, a goal that has universally been called utopian. Because Congress has failed to address the law since it came up for reauthorization in 2007, its mandated targets have continued to increase, creating a slow-moving time bomb for schools. Duncan projected that [82 percent of schools would be deemed as failing](#) by next year.

If the bar keeps increasing, more and more schools will not make AYP and face "a significant financial impact."

Definitely need to do something and cannot let our schools and children fail. Thankfully the schools in our district are monitoring our children's progress closely and we are staying abreast of the situation. Our state legislative advocacy director Barb Quinn is also watching the progress regarding this matter closely. We will keep you informed.

SECRETARY – Michele Sheppard

A frequently asked question is what is the correct procedure for approving the minutes?



The following is taken from the Illinois PTA Answer Book, Secretary Section.

Minutes of the previous meeting are read at the opening of each meeting. If individual copies of the minutes have been provided to the members ahead of time or are lengthy, it is appropriate to allow an opportunity for the members to read them privately and dispense with the public reading. Corrections should be noted in red and initialed by the secretary. The use of "Respectfully submitted" is not necessary. "Approved" or "approved as corrected" and the date of the approval, should be written at the end of the minutes of each meeting. The minutes are signed by the secretary or secretary pro tem.

If a long period of time will elapse before the next meeting, or if there is a change in the body (such as at the end of the year), it is appropriate for the president to appoint an audit committee for the minutes. The secretary should not serve on this committee. The committee audits the minutes for accuracy and notes changes on the minutes. In addition to the secretary's signature, the audit committee would also sign the minutes.

Arlington Heights Council of PTAs


